Dear LIS Professionals,

A very useful Panel Discussion was held on Saturday 30th May on "Libraries in Lock down: Issues and Challenges".

Panel Members discussed the Services to be provided & the Precautions to be taken during both the current & post COVID period.

4) Ms. Anubha Arora & Ms Anshula Srivastava briefed us School about Libraries.

An Interesting Workshop on Creativity was organized twice by ADINET. It was initially held for a few LIS Professionals. Since they found it useful, it was conducted again by Dr Arpan Yaqnik.

A virtual condolence meeting was held for Dr Anil Kumar Librarian of IIM A who passed away on 17th July.

Unfortunately, on Teacher's September our respected LIS Teacher & University Librarian Mr. Ramanbhai Patel also met his untimely death. A virtual condolence meeting was also held for Shri. R. L. Patel, which lasted for three hours.

PANEL DISCUSSION: A REPORT

Dr Mayank Trivedi, University Librarian of the M. S. University, spoke about an important topic: Electronic Resource Management: Issues & Challenges.

In his power point presentation Dr Trivedi covered the electronic environment and the technological explosion, in which most resources are transformed into an e-form. This enables libraries to access collective scholarly resources which one Library could never afford. He emphasized on the need for Digital Libraries which are playing a vital role

for disseminating information.

Dr Mayank Trivedi focused on the need for Electronic Resource Management (ERM) and gave a comparison between the Traditional Environment & the Electronic Environment. He stressed on the fact that ERM would help to improve collaboration. He explained the need for developing Digital Libraries and for using electronic resources, the major reason being dwindling budgets. He covered in detail how one can manage both the print collection & the electronic collection. Finally, he gave the advantages, disadvantages, challenges and also the benefits of ERM. Another important point covered by him was License Agreements.

Dr Narendra Ardeshna, Librarian of the Public Libraries of the Rajkot Municipal Corporation gave a detailed account of the twenty-two Public Libraries in Rajkot which he is handling. Besides these 22 Libraries, they also have two Mobile Libraries for Women & Children. For their 32,000 Users they have a collection of two lakh Books, 14,000 Digital Resources, 7,600 Toys, Games & Puzzles, 1050, Newspapers & Magazines, 4000 Audio Books & 20 Kindles. They provide a large number of services & also conduct Library Extension Programs in their mini Open-Air Theatre. These programs include screening film shows for children, conducting various workshops, book reviews talks, quiz competitions, seminars, counseling & poetry recitals. All the 24 Libraries & Services are handled by 9 library professionals & 39 non-professionals. Even during the lockdown period & thereafter, they have been providing several services by taking all precautions & are also giving online services. They are giving books to the slum children and are even helping in the cleanliness drive.

Ms Anubha Arora, Librarian of the Redbricks School in Santej spoke about

Libraries in Lockdown: Issues and Challenges

Ms Arora commenced her presentation with a brief introduction of the school library.

She felt that school libraries are mostly undervalued, whereas they set a base and they shape an individual by creating interest and motivating them to read at a very early stage of their life. This leads them to be a life-long learner. So, in reality school libraries shape the future of the students.

Bharucha Madam was appreciated for her vision and valuing school library by guiding and providing them a platform for discussion and collaboration. ADINET team was also thanked for their efforts.

Objectives of the school library were given by her. This would help recognize the issues and later to work on the challenges faced. The prime objective of the school library is to support the education needs of students, teachers and non-teaching staff. Encouraging and fostering reading habits among the users is very essential. Optimum utilization of resources to facilitate users was also highlighted. Last but not the least, it was essential to align with the school mission.

Ms Arora covered the issues & challenges faced during this Pandemic. She felt that it was essential to adapt to the change, accept the challenges, face them and utilize this opportunity. Basically it involved learning, practicing and sharing the knowledge gained. This will surely metamorphize librarians to information managers.

Library Services were also discussed by her. This included providing virtual library platform to the users, some engaging tools or promoting online events/ happenings to suit the interest of the users. Awareness about e-textbooks, tutorials, video lectures could also be rendered. Weblinks to K-12 e-resources and digital libraries will form an important feature of library services. Library online sessions may be taken through either synchronous or asynchronous learning, following the school guidelines.

THE CREATIVITY WORKSHOP



The Creativity Workshop was held on 17th June 2020. It was conducted by Dr. Arpan Yagnik who is a faculty at the Penn State University. He is a Creativity Expert, an author & a TEDx Speaker. He is very passionate about Creativity & enjoys teaching it.

"You cannot make yourself successful.
You can only make other people successful
If you do it, you will be successful"
This seems to be Dr. Arpan's mantra he has become successful by teaching others
Creativity so that they can become successful.

Owing to the pandemic which has spread all over the planet, there is a demand for change & more so a need to evolve. It is now essential to change our attitude & also change the way we work by investing in new skills. Before Covid 19 the methods we used, the way we functioned, everything was fixed and the paths to success were pre-charted.

Now things have changed, means & methods of the past have gone, life is not any more charted. This shift makes skills like creativity quintessential.

He stressed on the need & importance of Libraries, he said just imagine a society without libraries. He also felt that Librarianship was not easy, it is indeed challenging as Library Professionals have to work with humans. He also defined Librarians by stating that they are selfless, proactive & are society makers.

It was a very interactive workshop & one of the participants made a very apt statement that "Librarians were custodians of the past & architects of the future"

As we grow we undergo two tunneling processes, one is the conditioning done by our parents & the second is the education which shapes us. Due to this we develop a tunnel vision, especially leaving Creativity behind.

Since we are used to doing things in a certain way, creativity helps us to come up with new valuable ideas, which enables us to find easier way of doing the same thing.

Creativity gives us the drive & ability to do something new or to connect the seemingly unconnected things in significant ways so as to enrich our understanding of ourselves, our communities, the world & our universe.

He gave the following four components of Creativity:

1. Finding Facts

This shows us what it is. He asked us to identify what are the five facts about your library which are unique & unknown. This helps us to find what is lacking in our libraries.

2. Naming Names

It helps us to clearly know what it is not. It also helps us to step out of the box.

3. Common Things

This helps us to find similarities, as to what is common between uncommon objects. This may help to predict & increase visits to our libraries.

4. New Definitions

This gives new meanings to existing situations, structures and systems. It does so by befriending ambiguity and manipulating it.

Besides Creative Aerobics, there are other creativity methods. Other methods use Brain Storming, which may not work well with individuals & need to be done in a group. Whereas Creative Aerobics can be done by an individual. It helps us to shift our focus from solution driven thinking to process driven thinking.

This interactive Workshop was both interesting & informative. Mostly all the fifty-two participants interacted with the speaker.

personality was born on 27th September 1946 in Ahmedabad. He got his primary education in Ahmedabad and professional qualification Gujarat from University. Ramanbhai worked as College Librarian at Mehsana (N.G.), Assistant Librarian Saurashtra University Raikot and University Librarian at Gujarat University. He was associated with teaching in the subject Library & Information Science Saurashtra University - Rajkot as a Visiting Faculty and after that a Reader. After joining Gujarat University library, he rendered his services to the LIS department till 2018 as one of the Visiting Faculty. He was invited as a Guest Faculty at LIS department Gujarat Vidyapith too; where he worked until he breathed last.

He will be remembered as a dynamic leader, good administrator, problem solver and a daring towering personality. He nominated by the Vice-Chancellor, Gujarat many University for committees. extended his expertise while drafting the Gujarat Public Library Act - 2001 as one of the members. Almost all state universities of Gujarat are blessed with his outstanding teaching expertise.

He was also engaged in *Gujarat Granthalay* Seva Sangh and Akhil Gujarat University and College Pensioners Association as a Vice President.

During his journey as LIS professional he attended number of conferences and seminars. He was a Life Member of ILA, IASLIC, IATLIS and GGSS.

On 5th September, when India was celebrating Teacher's Day; he left for the heavenly abode. He will always remembered as а aood teacher, administrator, dynamic leader, hard-task master, perfectionist and above all, a perfect human being with a gentle heart.

Post Covid-19 World Verses Pre Covid-19 World

Dr. M. G. Sreekumar, Chief Information

Officer & Adjunct Professor, IIM- Kozhikode. In this presentation Dr Sreekumar covered the difference between the post Covid-19 world with the pre-Covid-19.

He stated that adaptation is the key word. He quoted Charles Darwin - "It is not the strongest of the species that survives, nor the most intelligent that survives. It is the one that is the most adaptable to change". This pandemic has forced us to become entrepreneurs & also showed us the need to be close to nature. It is essential to look at any crisis as an opportunity to innovate. It has forced us to adopt Digital Transformation & this will also shape how our library will work in the future. Now there is a dire need for Digital Transformation. In today's online learning environment, it is no longer an abstract concept for an education institute. They need to consider it & plan for the future.

He covered its 5 competencies which are

- 1. Digital Content Creation
- 2. Safety
- 3. Problem Solving
- 4. Information & Data literacy
- 5. Communication & Collaboration.

During this pandemic he gave the special Agenda for Libraries.

- Strategizing the library system to face challenges
- Importance of being agile & resilient
- Providing special services during lockdown
- People, staff & space management
- Technological implications & applications
- Measures for infection control
- Importance of being agile
- Ability to quickly adapt
- Survival of the quickest, not the intelligent or fittest

The work flow would be: Agility to Adaptability to Flexibility

To do this the prerequisites are; Capacity Building, Up Skilling, Capability, Competency He covered Library Strategies, Systems & Services - A Catalyst in Imparting, Creating, and Preserving Knowledge. He felt that it was imperative to envision our collections, services, spaces & operations with the hope that they inspire our users with new thinking & knowledge curiosity, encourage learning & advancing knowledge. This will require new strategies for L.I.Cs and the need to move from documents & information to Data at the granular level. It will be Data Science, Data Engineering, Data Arts & Data Literacy together with People & Space Management & Center for Creativity. We need to create a Knowledge Hub, Research Hub, Technology Hub, Entrepreneur Hub, Recreation Hub & Innovation Hub.

He explained Digital Transformation, eresources, Content Aggregation & Smart Integration in detail. From their Digital Library which is a vast corpus of knowledge, special access services are provided. Now we have Open Knowledge which comprises of Open Access, Open Sources OER, Open Courses, Open Text books, Open Innovation, Data, Open Open Research & Open Scholarship. He ended his presentation by covering the services etc., provided & the special academic support during lockdown period.

New Normal - Post Covid Scenario of TERI Library.

Dr Shantanu Ganguly, Fellow Knowledge Management Division & Program Manager Distant Learning

He gave a brief overview of TERI Knowledge Management Division, its Activities, Services & how Knowledge Management has played a significant role. He covered the history TERI from 1974 to 2010 & gave timeline from 2010 to 2020. They conduct PAN India

projects as they have regional centers & local partners in India. They provide Research & Consultancy in Energy, Environment, Resource Efficiency, Agriculture & Sustainable Development.

He described

- 4. Communication Research
- 5. Service Research
- 6. Project Research
- 7. Production Research

They have developed a Research Intelligence Management System. They deliver their knowledge products on the user's desktop.

conduct research communication, They review data of literature, research aggregation from different sources, resources procurement for projects, customized knowledge services, setting up knowledge base platform on thematic areas.

A major role of a Librarian is to understand the needs of their users. In Research Data Management, they cover:
